We will focus on the types of materials and equipment used in weaving. We will experiment with paper weaving and will use a sketchbook to record our ideas and what we have learnt. <p>2 I can gather and review information, references and resources related to my ideas and intentions</p> <p>I can develop practical skills by experimenting with, and testing the qualities of a range of different materials and techniques</p>		<p>Lesson overview: Exploring paper crafts</p> <p>In this lesson, we will learn about different types of paper crafts. We will gather resources to inform our design ideas and will develop our practical skills by painting a design which we will to add to a folding fan. We will use a sketchbook to record our design ideas and our learning. This lesson includes some physical activity and equipment beyond pen, paper or pencil.</p> <p>Teacher adaptation to be made to ppt/ lesson:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Chn to reflect on types of paper crafts from ppt – ideally chn to create own reflections in their books using images or a premade sheet of the types, their definitions and examples for the chn to match up may be the quickest way if time is limited. 2) Include some examples of artwork by Reiko Sudo and Honkusai. Children to use pre-printed images from artists and to reflect on examples in their sketchbooks using questions below to guide reflections.  <p>What do the colours and shapes remind you of? How did Reiko create this art installation?</p>   <p>Can you describe the shape of the waves? We will experiment with decoupage and will use our sketchbook to gather ideas about materials and techniques which will inform our own making. This lesson includes some physical activity and equipment beyond pen, paper or pencil.</p> <p>Teacher adaptation to be made to ppt/ lesson: include some examples of artwork by artists Mary Delaney from 1775, modern artists Mchael Brennand-Wood and Chila Kumari Singh Burman from ppt for chn to stick into sketchbooks. Chn to reflect using questions below to guide:</p> <p>What can you see in this picture? Describe the colours you can see. How do you think it was made? What materials do you think have been used to make it? What do you think of when you look at the artwork? Where do you think this artwork has been placed? And why do you think that?</p>  <p>Chn to reflect in sketchbooks: What worked well in your decoupage? What can you improve on next time? What ideas will you use in your next piece of work?</p>	<p>Teacher CPD video will help guide your teaching and modelling. We will evaluate our work as it progresses. We will reflect on what has worked well and how we could improve it. We will write an exhibition label to accompany our work and will share our work with others. This lesson includes some physical activity and equipment beyond pen, paper or pencil.</p> <p>What have you completed so far? What materials have you used? What techniques have you used? What do you need to do next? What materials, techniques and mediums will you use? How does it look? Do you need to make any changes?</p> <p>Chn to reflect in sketchbooks alongside a labelled sketch of their final piece: What materials did you use? Does your choice of materials work well on your box? Why? What was most successful? What would you change if you made it again?
